We can use general time expressions with

Never (at no time) negative only: I've never eaten horse meat.

Time expressions

the Present Perfect.

Ever (any time in your life) questions: Have you ever climbed a mountain?

Yet (now/this moment) questions and negative:

Have you done your homework yet? He hasn't spoken to his parents yet.

The Present Perfect connects past events to the present. We use it for:

- news: A train has crashed in London. =
  - = It crashed in the recent past, the results can be seen now.
- recent actions: The cat's played in the kitchen. =
- = The cat played in the past, now the kitchen needs cleaning.
- finished actions which are linked to the present:
   I've worked in three countries. = I worked abroad in the past, but it is important in my CV now.

# Present Perfect with since and for

- Use since + time expression to show when the event started:
- I've been at this school since I was thirteen. = I started here when I was thirteen, I am here now.
- With since, use a point or moment in time: 1978,
   Tuesday, last winter, on my birthday, yesterday, etc.

#### for

- Use for to show the amount of time between when the event started and now:
- I've been at this school for four years. = = I started at this school four years ago and I am here now.
- With for, use an amount or period of time: five minutes, two weeks, most of my life, a long time, ages, etc.

### Mind the trap!

We use *since* only with the Present Perfect: He's worked here **since** 1998. not He worked here since 1998.

We use *for* with the Past Simple and the Present Perfect:

My teacher has taught in this school **for** ten years. My grandmother taught in a primary school **for** thirty years.


We use ago only with the Past Simple: My dad worked in that factory five years ago. not My dad has worked there five years ago.






